Overview:	Funding will support implementation of body-worn camera (BWC) programs in law enforcement agencies. The intent is to help agencies develop, implement, and evaluate a BWC program as one tool in an agency's comprehensive problem-solving approach to improve officer safety, enhance evidentiary value, and enhance officer interactions in ways that contribute to building community trust and facilitating cooperative engagements. While this grant supports the purchase of BWCs, it will encompass more than just the acquisition of equipment. Integral components of the grant program include policy development, collaboration with other criminal justice agencies and community stakeholders, and adherence to evolving technological, training, and legal standards. Challenges may include chronic crime problems, emerging crime problems, or barriers to justice agencies' ability to address such problems, including those related to law enforcement, prosecution, sentencing, jail and prison, probation and parole. For example, high-cost drivers may include opioid and substance abuse; high system utilization by populations with significant mental health issues; repeat violent offenders; or lack of information sharing or technology integration within the criminal justice system. Examples such as these make it very difficult and costly for communities to ensure the security of their residents. Overview: The Prison Industry Enhancement Certification Program (PIECP) enables prisoners to repay their debt to society, reduce incarceration costs, and prepare for release with improved work prospects. In the process, PIECP supports victims' families, decreases recidivism, generates products and tax income for local economies, and uses free-market principles and private-sector participation to improve efficiency in the corrections industry. The primary purpose is to provide technical assistance to current PIECP certificate holders and related CACs to ensure they are operating PIECP projects in accordance with 18 U.S.C. 1761(c) and the BJA PIECP guidelines (64 Fed. Reg. 17000-17016 (April 7, 1999)). Technical assistance will be provided to applicants interested in applying for a certificate under PIECP and ensuring that certificate holders deemed non-compliant receive the necessary assistance to become compliant. Applicants should anticipate that this project will entail assisting up to 50 PIECP certificate holders held by state and local governmental agencies nationwide.

Overview: FDOT offers multiple state safety grant program opportunities aimed at reducing fatalities and injuries.

Police Traffic Services - Funding focuses on enforcing traffic safety laws and regulations; reduce traffic-crashes and resulting fatalities and injuries; provide aid and comfort to the injured; provide investigation and reporting of specific details and causes of traffic crashes; provide supervision of traffic crash and highway incident clean-up; and provide maintenance of safe and orderly movement of traffic along the highway system.

Speed and Aggressive Driving - Funding is focused on problem identification, communication program, and enforcement countermeasures. Items eligible for funding under this category may include speed measuring devices, radar display trailers, and public awareness materials.

Impaired Driving - Funding focused on driving down impaired driving fatalities by supporting a variety of strategies to target impaired driving. Funds can be used for DUI enforcement activities and equipment, providing awareness and education campaigns, conducting proactive youth-focused DUI education and outreach, and specialized education for law enforcement and prosecution to increase effective DUI adjudication.

Motorcycle Safety - Funding is focused on problem identification, communication program, and enforcement countermeasures. Items eligible for funding under this category may include overtime enforcement, equipment, and public awareness materials.

Occupant Protection and Child Passenger Safety - Funding intended to reduce fatalities and injuries to those who do not use age-appropriate safety restraints. Funding supports the high visibility enforcement activities of state and local law enforcement agencies. These activities address safety belt use and child restraint laws during both day and nighttime hours with emphasis on Florida's four high-risk populations.

Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety - Funding focused on activities to improve pedestrian and bicycle safety through the reduction of serious injuries and fatalities resulting from traffic crashes. Subgrants may be awarded for assisting in addressing pedestrian and bicycle safety deficiencies, expansion of an ongoing activity, or development of a new pedestrian and bicycle safety program.

Traffic Records - Programs receiving grant funding in this priority area are focused on the improvement of collection and analysis of traffic data such as crash data, roadway data, driver data, vehicle data, citation/adjudication data, and the Statewide Injury Surveillance System (SWISS) data.

Work Zone Safety - Funding is focused on enforcing traffic laws in the work zone area, and public awareness and education regarding work zone safety, communication program, and enforcement countermeasures. Eligible funding may include overtime enforcement and public awareness materials.
